
Thoughts from the porch

Hello my fellow Compatriots. My humble and heartfelt apologies for not having the newsletters out in a more timely and efficient manner.



On August 16th of the past year, we personally delivered a message to Governor Jay Nixon! Our Flag Rally was a huge success! Thank you to all who made this historic event possible!



The Need for More Confederate Gentlemen

[A Lee—Jackson Day Message]

LEE AND JACKSON'S FAVORITE SCRIPTURE

"I prefer the Bible to any other book. There is enough in that to satisfy the most ardent thirst for knowledge; to open the way to true wisdom; and to teach the only road to salvation and eternal happiness," *General R. E. Lee.*¹ Lee's favorite passage of Scripture was likely Psalm 144.²

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are the called according to His purpose"—Romans 8:28. [This was Stonewall Jackson's text.]

LEE AND JACKSON ACKNOWLEDGED AS GENTLEMEN

"Lee was my beau-ideal of the highest type of Christian gentlemen," said Rev. Edward Clifford Gordon.

"General Jackson is the best informed soldier I have met in America, and as perfect a gentleman as I have ever known!" said an English gentleman of rank.³

INTRODUCTION

A "gentleman" is a genteel man. In other words he is noble in the Christian sense of the word. He is a man of character. Character is what a man actually is and not what a man is perceived to be or perceives himself to be, which is reputation. Douglas Southall Freeman distilled Robert E. Lee's visible life into one word, "Character!"

Gen. R. E. Lee was considered the consummate Southern Christian gentleman. He exemplified the best in Southern manhood. Freeman remarked, "In Lee the South sees character.... Success could not dim it. Public adulation could not tarnish it. Defeat could only test it. For character is invincible."

James Power Smith wrote of the simplicity of Stonewall Jackson's character. "He was in character and will more like a stone wall than any man I have ever known."

In a day of many mixed signals about morality the use even of our words has become suspect. One can often hear a criminal that has been convicted of murder referred to as a gentleman by lawyers and others who are in positions of responsibility. Our language is being devalued.

How can Southern men lead the South back to the culture of their forefathers? Certainly not by aping men such as the drunken Grant, the pyromaniac Sherman, or the agnostic Lincoln. The South must have men such as Lee, Jackson, Stuart, Davis, Stevens, Pelham and the myriad of others who were Christian gentlemen. These Christian gentlemen practiced their faith in a manly way. Christian gentlemen are not effeminate! Southern men of Confederate ancestry must seek to be such gentlemen. Unless this is true of us no amount of flag waving, monument preservation, memorializing of our Confederate dead, promotion of Southern literature or any such will make a lasting impact on our generation. The stone monuments to Lee, Jackson, and others have something missing; they have no hearts for Christ, as did the men they represent. Southern men must be men whose lives demand respect. We must have credibility!

What made Lee and Jackson great men and great warriors? Not their military training. Not their social position. Not their intellects. Their greatness was found in their relationship with the Lord. As Lee's Psalm reminds, "Blessed be the LORD my strength, which teacheth my hands to war, and my fingers to fight: My goodness, and my fortress; my high tower, and my deliverer: my shield, and he in whom I trust; who subdueth my people under me" (Ps. 144:1-2).

First, one needs to be a Christian to be a Southern Gentleman. In creation "God hath made man upright" but as a result of the fall, in the Garden of Eden, man "sought out many inventions" (Eccl. 7:29). Man has tried to evade God's mandates for his life by using his mind to devise or invent other ways. Man outside Christianity has "many inventions" or many fallen speculations of heart that are foreign to God. "Jesus answered and said unto him (Nicodemus), Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God" (John 3:3). A Christian is a person who has been born anew by the Holy Spirit, has

been convicted of his sins against God repenting of them, and has embraced Christ as his only Lord and Saviour by faith. "A man is a gentleman in the same proportion that he is a Christian."

Lee's Psalm says, "Blessed be the LORD ... in whom I trust" (Ps. 144:1, 2). The believer is given a new nature whereby old things have passed away and all things have become new. The one solely trusting in Christ alone for salvation has the Christian graces of love, joy, peace, longsuffering, gentleness, meekness, temperance, and many more such attributes, which are the true traits of character. And Jackson's text reminds us of the providence of God toward His own, "All things are working together for good to them who love God" (Rom. 8:28).

R. E. Lee, the Christian gentleman, reflected, "I can only say that I am nothing but a poor sinner, trusting in Christ alone for salvation." Are you trusting in Christ alone for salvation? Of Christ we are told, "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men, whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12). Lee's life exemplified the presence of Christ and the Christian graces (Gal. 5:22-23).

Another Christian gentleman Stonewall Jackson reflected in a letter to his wife, "while we attach so much importance to being free from temporal bondage, we must attach far more to being free from the bondage of sin." Only God's Son can break the chains of that bondage to sin. Jackson remarked, "The Christian should carry his religion into everything." Paul, the apostle, has reminded us, "Whether therefore ye eat, or drink, or whatsoever ye do, do all to the glory of God" (1 Cor. 10:31). Stonewall sought to live in that fashion.

Second, when a man is a Christian he will be on his way to being a gentleman. One needs to have experienced the saving work of Christ in order to be a true gentleman in the historic Southern sense of the word. Thomas Nelson Page, the great Southern writer wrote of his father, "To be a Virginia gentleman was his first duty; it embraced being a Christian and all the virtues. He lived as one; he left it as a heritage to his children." Captain Dabney Carr Harrison¹¹ heard Lee say, "The virtue and fidelity which should characterize a soldier, can be learned from the holy pages of the Bible alone." What an astounding observation!

Stonewall Jackson wrote a nephew, and in that letter said, "I hope that you are a Christian. There is no happiness like that experienced by a child of God." Truly there is nothing to compare with being in a saving relation to God. Jackson, the Christian gentleman, summed up his faith when he said, in the words of his wife, "he had been a long time ... stranger to fear because he knew and was assured of the love of Christ to his soul: he felt not the faintest dread that he should ever fall under the wrath of God, although a great sinner; he was forever reconciled by the righteousness of Christ, and that love for God and Christ was now the practical spring of all his penitence." Have you turned to Christ having renounced your sin?

Lee, as president of Washington College, explained **the code of honor** – "be a gentleman." That was succinct and implied what the culture of the day expected, which of necessity included being a practicing Christian. Really there is no other kind of Christian. Lee answered an inquiring student, "Young gentleman, we have no printed rules. We have but one rule here, and it is that every student must be a gentleman." Sadly the

Southern culture of today is not producing such men. The reason seems to be the ignoring or despising of Biblical Christianity in favor of pseudo-Christianity or none at all, which leaves men pagans. Paul the apostle warned against "having a form of godliness, but denying the power thereof," and he said, "from such turn away" (2 Tim. 3:5).

Lee composed **a test for a true gentleman** during the war for Southern independence. "The forbearing use of power does not only form a touchstone, but the manner in which an individual enjoys certain advantages over others is a test of a *true gentleman*. The power which the strong have over the weak, the magistrate over the citizen, the employer over the employed, the educated over the unlettered, the experienced over the confiding, even the clever over the silly—the forbearing or inoffensive use of all this power or authority, or a total abstinence from it when the case admits it, will show the gentlemen in a plain light. The gentleman does not needlessly remind an offender of a wrong he may have committed against him. He cannot only forgive, he can forget; and he strives for that nobleness of self and mildness of character which imparts sufficient strength to let the past be but the past. A true man of honor feels humbled himself when he cannot help humbling others." 14

The need of the hour is Southern men of quality, which is another way of reiterating the point of this message. Lee and Jackson certainly had a grasp of gentlemanliness and exemplified it. Even so the Sons of Confederate Veterans should be men of quality.

"Honor thy father and thy mother" (Ex. 20:12)! How can we be said to honor our Confederate ancestors if we deny the very principles by which they lived? The best way to honor Christian gentlemen of the past is to emulate their Christian virtues. They externalized the Bible or they put it into active practice by their living.

What is required of Southern men in order to honor their forbearers? Men are needed who not only respect Christianity, but who are Christians in the true sense of the Word. Such men who are needed do not just acknowledge the Bible to be God's Word, but they practice the principles of that Word in every facet of life. The kind of men needed not only favor honor, but they honor and are honorable. They not only desire respect, but they are respectful and respectable. Needed are men who do not just want to be treated honestly, but are men of integrity. Gentlemen are men who respect the Lord, the home, the family, womanhood, neighbors and the church for which the Saviour died.

Men of Lee and Jackson's character died well. Jackson after days of suffering came to the end of his earthly sojourn on the Lord's Day, May 10th, 1863. "Anna read to him some comforting Psalms on his last night on earth. He labored harder and harder in his breathing. He asked his wife to sing some of the spiritual songs he loved. Others in the room joined in singing one he especially wanted to hear, which was Psalm 51 set to meter by Watts,

Show pity, Lord; O Lord forgive; Let a repenting rebel live; Are not thy mercies large and free? May not a sinner trust in thee?¹⁵

Consider the rest of the Psalter selection. "Near the end he sank rapidly into unconsciousness, murmuring out very cheerfully and distinctly the beautiful sentence which has become immortalized ever since, 'Let us cross over the river, and rest under the shade of the trees."


Lee's favorite Psalm prayerfully says, "Send thine hand from above; rid me, and deliver me out of great waters, from the hand of strange children; Whose mouth speaketh vanity, and their right hand is a right hand of falsehood" (Ps. 144:7-8). Would Lee today, if he were among us address the Lord to rid him "from the hand of strange children; Whose mouth speaketh vanity" (vv. 7, 11)? Are our words empty because they do not have a godly life to back them up? Where are the **honorable?** Where are the **Christian Gentlemen?**

Lee's Psalm ends, "Happy is that people, whose God is the LORD." We must remember, "Salvation is of the Lord." God save the South, we plead in Jesus' name!


